Pneumatic action all through.
Electric motor and blower.
New draw stop knobs.
Manual keys re-voiced.
3 new couplers.
All old work left completely repaired.

The new couplers, being put in now, will cost nothing and give us a total of 31 stops. The cost of connecting up the motor with the transforming station in the kitchen garden has to be added to the amount. The sum in hand at present is £530 10s. od. We have therefore £219 10s. od. still to raise, as well as the cost of connecting.

Wild helped him to put on 50 runs for the fifth wicket, and Pollard shewed initiative and confidence in his 18 not out. Thorman's 76 was a very fine innings, but on such an easy scoring ground, the School should have made more runs. St. John's started well and despite steady good length bowling by Allen put on 46 for the first wicket, and then lost six wickets for 90 runs, Hamilton taking one splendid catch high up with one hand at cover and Thorman another good one at square leg. The School fielding was good but the picking up not so clean as it should have been on such a ground. Boots inadequately spiked may fairly account for that. It appeared as though St. John's might be all out before time arrived but the School failed to separate the next pair, who carried the score to 138 when time came and just saved the School from being beaten.

S.E.S. then went in to bat and failed miserably before the bowling of Hall and Wheat, the latter keeping a beautiful length throughout the innings. Correspondence.

To the Editors of the S.E.S. Chronicle.

DEAR SIRS,

May I through the medium of your columns make one final plea for an institution, which you described so aptly in your last number as "White Prayers." Let it not be thought that the views which I am expressing are the result of mere sentimentalism: far from it. They are the collected unanimous opinions of people connected both internally and externally with the School. All the visitors regret the absence of surplices in Chapel, and most of them refuse "to see why." They maintain that they are a very strong tradition of the School, and as such ought not to be allowed to fade into mere oblivion. Can nothing be done to save them? If the Chapel like the Abbey were crumbling away, we should do everything in our power to save it; yet no one lifts a little finger to save the surplices. I am fully conscious that there are difficulties, but they are far from insuperable. Surely something can be done whereby surplices may come into their own again next term. As a suggestion why should not each new boy in future supply himself with a surplice? New boys vary in size: so would the surplices. At present we have enough large surplices, but scarcely any small ones. If something like this were done, surplices could be re-introduced again at the beginning of next term without much difficulty. However there are further obstacles (e.g., washing and mending). Could no one be found to wash them three times a year at a moderate price? This

ought not to be very difficult. The mending no longer constitutes a difficulty, as a person who is very much interested in the School (and especially in the surplices) has nobly offered to do all the mending free of charge. Surely something must be done, so that we may not have to turn down her kind offer. No one can get away from the fact that Chapel is not the same without them; it is bleak and cold. Cannot this be righted at the beginning of next term?
